

- I am a middle school mental health liaison. I help coordinate school based therapy via a partnership woth a local CMHC.

- RESIST, Engagement with Student Leadership in Area Schools, Student Based Organizations Let the students lead the conversation.
- Facilitate active youth councils for leadership development and dissemination planning
- Empowering and mobilizing teens to impact their peers and make sure that they are involved in the process of prevention from beginning stages of planning to carrying out messaging and events
- Share and converse with them about the outcomes of their educational evaluations and how it relates to their present and future needs and goals.
- Provide funding for trainings for students

# ADA Rights and Protections for People with SUD

#### What is the signal?

A movement to recognize and ensure that people receive the federal protections and accommodations they are entitled to through the Americans With Disabilities Act, Rehabilitation Act, and Fair Housing Act.

Increased awareness of potential solutions to barriers while residing in recovery housing can facilitate access to care for individuals with SUD and help them sustain their recovery.

## Collateral Consequences of Drug Convictions

#### What is the signal?

The Legislative Analysis and Public Policy Association (LAPPA) has drafted a model law addressing the issue of collateral consequences of drug and drug-related convictions for states to use to mitigate the impact of such consequences.

#### Why does it make you hopeful?

There is increasing awareness of the collateral consequences that come with drug convictions and are directly impacting someone's ability to successfully re-enter the community.
